# The Solar Eclipse

The 2017 school year began with a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

On August 21,2017, a total solar eclipse was visible in many parts of the country. It occurs when the solar phase of the moon completely covers the sun. Although not in the path of totality, we experienced a partial eclipse in New Bern.

Viewing an eclipse is tricky, though. Because of the risk of retina damage, no one should look directly at the sun. CBCS took special precautions, helping students and staff view it safely.

Preparations were made to view the solar eclipse during school. Mr. Eldred, high school history teacher, made box projectors for the students to view the eclipse. Students turned their backs to the sun, held up the box, and aligned it with the sun. A small pinhole projected a silhouette of the eclipse on a white piece of paper.

Some students bought special glasses that allowed them to view the eclipse safely. The glasses allowed a larger, more direct view than the box projector. Also, students had the opportunity to see the eclipse from different states through live streams from NASA and one from Bob Jones University in Greenville, South Carolina.

In many ways, the eclipse was a great

learning experience for the students and a nice break from class. Many were amazed by the phenomenon happening in the sky. Most likely, we will not have another one for almost a hundred years.

#### **EDITORIAL**

Kids are easily influenced. They want expensive organic yogurt if Spider-man or Elsa is pictured on it. Adults want their favorite player's jersey or makeup worn by their favorite actress. While this influencing tactic is profitable for marketing and business, it has caused serious problems in the media department. Some companies place innuendos in their shows and books to promote unbiblical views. It imposes a threat to Christians and our beliefs.

Two examples of influencing messages in children's entertainment are Disney's Zootopia and DreamWorks Animation's Kuna Fu Panda 3. Zootopia is a light-hearted story about a rabbit cop attempting to solve a case. Early in the film, Nick the fox is denied service at an ice cream shop. The owner justifies his refusal with a sign saying, "We reserve the right to refuse service to anyone." On screen, this notice is presented as something unjust and cruel. However, it seems to reference the current news of Christian businesses put under fire due to their refusal to bake wedding cakes for homosexual couples. Throughout the movie, the prey minority becomes violent toward the predator majority, even though the predators are innocent. It seems to parallel the recent Black Lives Matter protests/riots. More topics like these are mentioned in the film.

Kung Fu Panda 3 is an action-packed story about Po the panda meeting his biological father and saving a village of pandas from utter destruction. In the preceding movies, it is established that

Po was abandoned as a cub and adopted by a goose named Mr. Ping. In *Kung Fu Panda 3*, Po's biological father appears. At the end of the movie, Po is living with two fathers. This plot makes sense with the biological and adoptive parent; but morally, it teaches kids that having two fathers or two mothers is acceptable.

Television is not the only media that is including brainwashing messages. The Trials of Apollo by Rick Riordan is a prime example in the book category. The narrator in the story comments that his daughter has two fathers. A gay couple is also featured. The narrator proceeds to justify his statements by bringing up stranger stories. 
Last year was a practice year. They did local runs and races but never competed against different teams.

### **Book Review**

A captivating journey of a Christian converted Muslim and her endeavors to escape the constricting practices of the Islamic community, Hiding in the Light: Why I Risked Everything to Leave Islam and Follow Jesus details the experiences and spiritual growth of Rifga Bary. Chronologically recounting the events leading to the rift between Islamic traditions and her new found faith, Rifga's testimony portrays the struggles of living as an evangelistic Christian. Her immigration from her native country of Sri Lanka to America and the unanticipated exposure to Christianity leads to Rifqa questioning the validity of her Muslim faith. A fateful encounter with a Christian classmate arouses in her a desire to follow Christianity, leading to a heightened sense of compassion and inner joy. Hateful disapproval from strict Muslim family members and the ensuing abuse, however, forces Rifqa to conceal her faith in the light of conflicting traditions upheld by her Sri Lankan heritage for generations. The perseverance of Rifqa through legal injustice, religious stigma, and cancer serves as a symbol of hope for others also paying the high price of serving Christ.

Rifqa's acceptance of Christ at the age of twelve had become the pinnacle moment in her life since immigrating to America, where the remaining ties

of her previous life in Sri Lanka were no longer constricting her beliefs. The fear of defying the honor of untold generations in her Muslim lineage was cast away and replaced with a determination to comprehend this undeniable Presence, whom she could sense while playing in the sunlit garden of her Sri Lankan home. Rifqa vividly recalls her final decision in abandoning Islam, saying, "Any doubts about what I was doing or about Jesus being the truth, all fractured into meaningless piles of vanquished fear as I became engulfed by truth Himself. I could no longer deny He was real. I could not deny what I was experiencing." (pg. 49) A resolution to pardon the grievances of the past and exercise compassion toward her father and brother, however, became difficult to accomplish, as tempers rose against Rifga's stubbornness to cease praying and memorizing the Quran. Reading the Scriptures late at night in the confines of her bedroom, or concealing earphones under the dark covering of her hijab to listen to quiet worship music, were her methods of choking the final remnants of Islam out of her life. Emboldened by this sense of liberty, Rifqa requested to become baptized before a congregation of her closest companions, committing her final act of derision against her former beliefs.

Comparing her life threatening plight to that of Joseph in the Old Testament, Rifqa left her previous life as a necessity for survival, leaving behind her frightening past under the cover of darkness.

Despite the months of indecisive court cases, and the moments when Rifga's freedom swaved in the balance between political advancement and the judge's final verdict, she persevered through her undoubting devotion to Christ. Inspired by the Apostle Paul's worship and unvielding faith during his imprisonment, Rifga remained optimistic during her time in juvenile detention. Her legal ordeals ignited an unquenchable desire to support the voiceless and oppressed, who are unable to declare their beliefs without enduring cruel persecution. Rifga's triumph over her illness and the threats of her family conveys the message that liberty and justice can be attained, as long as faith in Christ is sustained.




